uring the run-up to your wedding day, a lot of questions will be robbing you of your beauty sleep. Will those super-snug Spanx be visible? How will we keep Uncle Terry away from the free bar? Brides commissioned a huge guys-only survey. We asked the savvy men at GQ.com and wired.com; we quizzed friends and partners. We even hit the streets of London in our biggest vox-pop yet to find the answers to the all-important questions about your dress and the big day. 1,000 men gave us their thoughts and it turns out that they've got some pretty strong opinions.

'My philosophy is "less is more",' said one of our voters, Immy. 'If my bride is a stunning girl, she'll stand out regardless.' Meanwhile, other men see themselves as traditionalists: 'Considering my grandparents would be present, the dress shouldn't be over the top,' said Nico. 'It should show just a little bit of cleavage.' #### A DIY FAKE TAN GONE-HORRIBLY WRONG: 74%

For at-home success, follow these tips from A-list tanner James Read: 'If you want a product that suits your skin tone and doesn't overpower it, do a patch test first. Always use a tanning mitt to apply self-tan and then leave it on for four hours to achieve a weekend-away glow, eight hours for a week in the French Riviera, or sleep with it on for the two-weeks-away look.' #### A HAIRSPRAYED, HELMET HAIRDO: 47%

George Northwood, stylist at celeb salon Josh Wood, on how to avoid hairspray hell:
'A look that lasts is all about the preparation – you don't need a lot of product. If
you're wearing it down, a good blow-dry will give it hold. If you're
wearing it up, backcomb it then smooth over the top with a
Mason & Pearson brush. A light mist of hairspray is enough.'

### MORE MAKE-UP THAN THE TOWIE GIRLS ON A NIGHT OUT: 67%

'Pick a make-up look your other half is used to seeing you in and enhance it slightly,' says make-up artist Sarah Brock. If you usually go for natural eyeshadows, for instance, stick with them, but add a pop of liner and individual lashes to make it more special – strip lashes are too doll-like. Get your foundation professionally matched at a make-up counter; just don't apply too much.'

A FULL-ON, ADDAMS FAMILY-ESQUE VEIL: 42%

'Heavy veils are a thing of the past,' says Louise Dicks of veil specialist Richard Designs. 'Modern styles are finer and designed to create a soft halo effect. Many brides don't cover their face with a blusher veil; a longer style is ideal to enhance a plainer gown.'

### TOWERING HEELS THAT MEAN SHE CAN'T WALK DOWN THE AISLE WITHOUT WINCING: 41%

'Both style and comfort are key,' says Ruth Shaw of wedding shoe specialist Harriet Wilde. She advises against the old

ballet-pump switcheroo. 'Don't change into flats - your dress will be the wrong length. Rather buy good quality, comfortable shoes with padding and maybe a platform (left). I recommend a three-inch heel - still elegant but comfortable.'
